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pragmatics and discourse 2nd edition has been revised and reorganised to place more emphasis on pragmatics covers the core areas of the subject context and co text speech act theory conversation analysis exchange structure interactional sociolinguistics the cooperative principle politeness theory and extends to more applied areas corpus linguistics communities of practice and intercultural pragmatics interlanguage pragmatics language learning draws on a wealth of texts from bend it like beckham and the motorcycle diaries to political speeches newspaper extracts and blogs provides classic readings from the key names in the discipline from sperber and wilson to fairclough wodak and gumperz is accompanied by a

supporting website key features of the new edition include two new strands on corpora communities and culture language learning the merging of two strands on context and co text new material from speaker based cognitive linguistics updated references and fresh examples and exercises written by an experienced teacher and author this accessible textbook is an essential resource for all students of english language and linguistics

describes the characteristics structure and functions of spoken discourse covering aspects of genre variation and pedagogy

age is by far the most underdeveloped of the sociolinguistic variables in terms of research literature to date research on age has been patchy and has generally focused on the early life stages such as childhood and adolescence ignoring for the most part healthy adulthood as a stage worthy of scrutiny this book examines the discourse of adulthood and accounts for sociolinguistic variation with regards to age and gender through the exploration of a 90 000 word age and gender differentiated spoken corpus of irish english the book explores both the distribution and use of a number of high frequency pragmatic features of spoken discourse that appear as key items in the corpus part 1 of the book provides an introduction a theoretical overview of age as a sociolinguistic variable and a description on how to compile a small spoken corpus for sociolinguistic research part 2 consists of five chapters which investigate and explore key features such as hedges vague category markers intensifiers boosters and high frequent items of taboo language in relation to the variables age and gender the book is of interest to undergraduates or postgraduates taking formal courses in sociolinguistics applied linguistics pragmatics or discourse analysis it is also of interest to students and researchers interested in using corpus linguistics in sociolinguistic research

the chapters in this volume take as their focus aspects of three of the languages of scotland scots scottish english and scottish gaelic they present linguistic research which has been made possible by new and developing corpora of these languages this encompasses work on lexis and lexicogrammar semantics pragmatics orthography and punctuation throughout the volume the findings of analysis are accompanied by discussion of the methodologies adopted including issues of corpus design and representativeness

search possibilities and the complementarity and interoperability of linguistic resources together the chapters present the forefront of the research which is currently being directed towards the linguistics of the languages of scotland and point to an exciting future for research driven by ever more refined corpora and related language resources

vague language bags of time doing stuff and all that is an aspect of communicative competence of considerable social importance this book examines its function it spans genre analysis critical discourse analysis psycholinguistics and cross cultural sociolinguistics and suggests applications in tefl and directions for future research

in vague language elasticity theory and the use of some nguyet nhu le and grace qiao zhang present the first comprehensive study of the word some focusing on its elasticity in particular they consider how some is both a quantifier and a qualifier has positive or negative meanings and has local and global interpretations they show that the word is used across a meaning continuum and can be used to convey a range of states including approximation uncertainty politeness and evasion finally they demonstrate that the functions of some are also multi directional and non categorical consisting of four major functions right amount of information mitigation withholding information and discourse management based on naturally occurring classroom data of L1 american english and L2 chinese and vietnamese speaking learners of english speakers vague language shows that L2 speakers used some more than L1 speakers and explores the significance of this particularly taking account of speakers language ability and cultural backgrounds while this book focuses on the single word some the authors discussion has important implications for language studies more generally as they call for a rethinking of our approaches to language study and more attention to its elasticity

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pragmatics of society takes a socio cultural perspective on pragmatics and gives a broad view of how social and cultural factors influence language use the volume covers a wide range of topics within the field of sociopragmatics this subfield of pragmatics encompasses sociolinguistic studies that focus on how pragmatic and discourse features vary according to macro sociological variables such as age gender class and region variational pragmatics and discourse conversation analytical studies investigating variation according to the activity engaged in by the participants and the identities displayed as relevant in interaction the volume also covers studies in linguistic pragmatics with a more general socio cultural focus including global and intercultural communication politeness critical discourse analysis and linguistic anthropology each article presents the state of the art of the topic at hand as well as new research

anglophone literature in second language teacher education proposes new ways that literature and more generally culture can be used to educate future teachers of english as a second language arguing that the way literature is used in language teacher education can be transformed the book foregrounds transnational approaches and shows how these can be applied in literature and cultural instruction to encourage intercultural awareness in future language educators it draws on theoretical discussions from literary and cultural studies as well as applied linguistics and is an example how these cross discipline conversations can take place and thus help make second language teacher education slte programs more responsive to the challenges faced by future english language teachers written in the idiom of literary scholarship the book uses ideas of intercultural studies that have gained widespread support at research

level yet have not affected literature cultural curricula in site as the first interdisciplinary study to suggest how site programs can respond with curricula this book will be of great interest for academics scholars and post graduate students in the fields of applied linguistics l2 and foreign language education teacher education and post graduate tesol it has universal appeal addressing teaching faculty in any third level institution that prepares language teachers and includes literary studies in their curriculum as well as administrators in such organizations

this wide ranging introduction to practical aspects of english phonetics and phonology offers an accessible overview of the subject with activities study questions sample analyses commentaries and key readings

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
